Friday 25 June	"There are places I remember"	Wavertree is where I was born and live today. Let
1-2pm	(Lennon and McCartney, 1965)	me take you on a journey through an area whose history is lost in the mists of time, a place The Wavertree Society refer to as 'a City in miniature'.
		Discover its growth from a settlement by a lake, through its development into a village and township in its own right, to being a part of Liverpool. Experience buildings designed by some of Liverpool's top Victorian/Edwardian municipal architects, and Regency and Georgian Town Houses. Visit a late 1700 lock up, and walk in the childhood footsteps of two members of the fab four, sets for classic period TV shows, and a few surprise along the way.
Friday 2 July	Dressed to Impress	Learn why Liverpool has four magnificent 20 <sup>th</sup> Century buildings on its waterfront. Find clues to
1-2pm		its seafaring past such as some hidden docks, a lost railway, and the "glories" of its ocean line going past.
		Discover the background to the names of The Pier Head, Mann Island, The Goree and Canada Boulevard, learn what a 'Dicky Sam' was, and much morea place full of memories and memorials.
Friday 9 July	A Farewell to Marsh	Join us as we take a last look at IM Marsh.
1-2pm		Discover who used to live in the magnificent house on the site and why they are important to Liverpool's past, present and future.
		Externally view Liverpool's oldest building, dating back to the 12th Century and hear why some of the locals tried to avoid kicking the habit. Learn where Aigburth Hall was and who its last occupants were.
		We will also have time for any IM Marsh staff to share your experiences.

	my eyes"	the world, this walk is about using all your senses.
1-2pm	(Lennon and McCartney, 1967)	Its origins are lost in the mists of time as historically it was the boundary between two ancient townships that later became part of Liverpool. It is a place frequented by people who have been game changers, not just in the area of music and arts, but in business, social justice and ethics. We will start our walk at the head of the lane and work our way up to Greenbank Park.
Wednesday 21 July	"Let me take you down, because I am going to	Strawberry Field and Woolton." During this walk, we will get a chance to hear

		We will explore the sights of Woolton, and why the area feels different to the rest of Liverpool. The beauty of doing this on foot is that we will experience things that most visitors don't get to see, whether its the Beatles or heritage, as they are interlinked.
